Being hit by vehicle when crossing the road	Athletes, coaches, spectators	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Juniors advised to be careful crossing the road, primary aged children supervised when crossing</li> <li>• Additional signage to be considered by event organisers to warn traffic</li> </ul>	January 2011
Slipping on rocks at lower water levels	Athletes, coaches, spectators	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Take particular care at low water when rocks are greasy</li> </ul>	January 2011
Entrapment on rocks (including 'Magnetic Rock')	Athletes and coaches on the water	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Coaches set courses to ensure boats are moving away from rocks, rather than towards.</li> <li>• When water covers or almost covers 'magnetic rock' courses should be designed to either keep paddlers to the right of 'magnetic rock' OR designed in such a way to ensure crossing of the current above 'magnetic rock' is a river right to left move</li> <li>• When water levels are changing, dynamic risk assessment will alter the structure of sessions or competitions to control hazards</li> </ul>	January 2011
